
a celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

As we celebrate the life and achievements of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. here at the University of Utah, it's worthwhile to note that the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Memorial was dedicated on Sunday, October 16, 2011 on the Mall in Washington D.C.. This impressive monument sits adjacent to the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial, and is the first monument on the National Mall to honor a non-president, as well as the first to honor a man of color. The 30-foot statue is a tribute to the life and achievements of Dr. King.

The dedication was originally scheduled for August 28, 2011, the 48th anniversary of King's landmark "I Have a Dream" speech, but was shifted due to the threat of hurricanes.

The monument features two massive stone boulders, which represent the Mountain of Despair, from which the Stone of Hope, on which is carved the likeness of Dr. King,

emerges. The line "out of the mountain of despair, a stone of hope", from Dr. King's pivotal "I Have A Dream" speech, is carved in the stone. Cherry trees are planted on site, and will bloom each April (the month King was assasinated) continued on page 3


