SADC Statement



The Student Affairs Diversity Council was created to ensure that our staff understands that all students come to us as unique individuals and that we value how our students' diversity contributes to the depth and breadth of every student's education at the University of Utah. In this capacity, SADC provides learning opportunities, training sessions, and discussions to develop staff awareness, understanding, and skills to facilitate the success of our students, who face increasingly complex lives.

We condemn in the strongest possible terms white supremacy, neo-Nazi rhetoric, and hate based solely on an individual or a group's identity. These beliefs and actions have no place in our division, in our university, or in our nation. They are counter to everything we as the University of Utah represent. The recent posters on our LGBT members, and we all stand together in campus targeting our black students and colleagues serve as a reminder that these groups are deeply dangerous, spreading hate across many of our identities and against people we love. They seek to deprive a future to those who do not look, think, or act as they do. And, in doing so, they ignore American ideals and deprive our nation of its greatest

potential. Our nation is stronger because of the many contributions of those who are being targeted by hate groups. Opportunities to thrive must be expanded, not curtailed as propagated by these groups. In the future, it might be a black student who changes the course of medical science, a transgender student who writes a novel which comes to define a generation, or a Muslim student who takes political office and begins healing the wounds of a divided country. The push to silence these voices and these futures must be opposed in every corner of our university and, as members of the Diversity Council, we pledge to stand up against injustice, intolerance, and hate whenever and wherever we encounter it. We stand together. Our white members stand shoulder to shoulder with our members of color, our cisgender members stand with support the identities of every student and colleague and against those who hate.

We invite you to personally support this pledge as well. Attend a lecture, read a book, have a discussion, take a stand, but do something to demonstrate to others that hate has no home here.


